

Dear Readers,

We have been working on the topic of Modus Operandi since the past few months. We know we will have discussions but no firm answers to the point in discussion. The purpose of taking this topic is to initiate a thought process, get views from different sections where some work has been done at this level and present to the fraternity.

When we brought out the June issue on Research, we got lot of appreciation mails stating readers were happy to be informed about such work happening in homeopathy. But we also got some readers saying they were disappointed not to find much cases in the issue. I would submit that even this issue will not have many cases since we are discussing a more serious subject, which is questioning our very existence today but at the same time assure that each and every selection will be a worth read.

For the quantity of medicine being questioned by different schools, the fact is not that it cannot be measured, but is, that, it is beyond the measurement scale which physicists have today, that is, the maximum measurement can be done only up to Avogadro's number  $10^{23}$ . If we look at the science of nanopharmacology the definition says - selection of pharmaceuticals for specific individual to maximize effectiveness and minimize side effects; and delivery of pharmaceuticals to targeted locations or tissues within the body. Nanotechnology is generally defined as the science of constructing and assembling objects on a scale smaller than one hundred nanometers. The Nanopharmacology scientists are working on lines to reach a level where one day nanotechnology will be able to assemble nanomedibots that function like engineered white-blood cells - repairing tissue at a nanoscale scale where they use nanopsules which transport and release drugs. If we look at this more carefully, they are working on the lines where they will reach nowhere but to the science of homeopathy. As this is very similar to what exactly Hahnemann did 200 years back but did not have the technology to back him up. He recorded all the results to his experiments and presented to the world in the form of a theory. As rightly said Hahnemann was much ahead of his times.

We need both the Government and private organizations to work on this aspect of homeopathy. In fact, why only the organizations, at our level also we should try and do evidence based homeopathy to whatever extent we can. It will go a long way for us. In this issue, we have an article from a very right person to talk on this, that is, Dr Chatarbhuja Nayak, the Director of Central Council of Homoeopathy, India. The article throws light on the various fundamental evidence based research which has been done on homeopathy medicines including the invitro, animal studies, plant studies and clinical trials. He also gives a brief about the commendable work CCRH is doing in collecting the evidences for homeopathy.

A very true to the core article by Dr Brian Kaplan is a valuable contribution which states a simple fact that we should accept that today we don't know how a medicine acts. Since we give explanations and reasonings for things we don't know, we are made ridicule of. The idea is to just accept we don't know and then work on the path to find the truth.

Another article by Dr Gangar, who is an agricultural scientist, has conducted experiments which show that homeopathic drugs influence the genetic activity in the agricultural plant bodies in a big way. Since, there is neither brain nor any central nervous system in plants; known principles/theories of homeopathy cannot be applied there. It is found that medicated water (carrying homeopathic drug) contains intermolecular electrical charges. The paper explains how these electrical charges perform the act of transferring the energy, (received from original drug), into the concerned gene within the DNA of that cell to trigger the respective gene into the act of activation, acceleration, retardation or turning off its relevant activities. This is one of the ways which shows the action of homeopathic dilutions and proves them to be different than plain water.
